Volleyball in the SW continues to thrive. Entries for the SW Junior Grand Prix series have been up this season, with a noticeable improvement in quality. SW Junior teams take up places in three of the four national junior finals at Sheffield on April 18/19.

At a senior level we suffered a decline in the number of mens teams in the SW League this season, though the number of womens teams held up. In the Mens National Leagues, City of Bristol are 6^{th} in Div 1, Wessex 8^{th} in Div 2, while City of Bristol head Div 3 West. In the Womens NVL Wessex are 8^{th} in Div1, Plymouth 11^{th} in Div 2 and Devon are clear leaders in Div 3 West.

The most recent affiliations figures show that the SW continues to lead the other regions - having the large number of paid for affiliations and registrations of clubs, coaches and referees. Affiliation figures have remained strong - despite the "credit crunch" and club / junior affiliations are up on last season.

Volleyball England have been successful in their submission for an increased Sport England grant and we should see some of this filter down to the SW through programmes such as the Regional Grass Series, Lets Play Volleyball (Junior) Series and the Club and Coach fund - exciting times ahead.

As we look forward to this new four year VE Strategic Plan, we can also look back to when it all began in the SW. 2009 will see the 40^{th} anniversary of the founding of the SW Association. Elsewhere in the newsletter is more information about the early years and about some planned celebration events.

We hope that clubs will send representatives to hear about these exciting plans and help the SW Association to move forward with its own planning.

SW 40th Anniversary Celebrations

The SW Volleyball Association was established in 1969 and so this year will see us celebrating our 40th anniversary. As many of our clubs will be playing at the SWVA Senior Championships in

Plymouth on the weekend of June 13/14 we are going to hold a celebration buffet at the Eddystone Inn, Heybrook Bay Plymouth (PL9 OBN) on the Saturday evening.

The event will start at 7pm, with a buffet at 7.45 followed by a few short speeches / toasts at 8.30. Some may wish to stay on at the Inn, while others may choose to head off to their regular Plymouth / SW Championships haunts for the later part of the evening.

We will be inviting guests who were involved with the setting up of SWVA and were active in its early years. We hope that many of those playing at Plymouth that weekend will join us and that others who are not involved in the Championships may like to some and have a pleasant weekend in Plymouth with the opportunity to meet old friends on the Saturday evening.

On October 4^{th} we will hold the SW Veterans Tournament in Bournemouth. This provides another opportunity for a celebration and we hope to organize a celebration event on the Saturday evening - October 3^{rd} , for those taking part in the Vets and for any others who might like to join us. SW Competitions

The SW Men's League has been completed with City of Bristol topping the table after their 8 games, Torexe finishing as runners-up. Although having a reduced number of games due to only five teams entering the league for 2008/09, all matches were played, there were no disputes and there was a very good level of organisation between the teams. Clearly it is hoped that there will be a larger number of entries for next season and, with that in mind, Countrymen & Plymouth have agreed to play in a series of matches with the existing teams for the remainder of the season (up to the end of April).

The Women's League , containing eight teams, is currently headed by Torexe Queens. Again, all the matches to date have been played and the final fixture of the season is scheduled for 19 April.

The Volleyball England Regional Champions Trophy is being run again over the weekend 16 & 17 May, the weekend after the SW Championships. This year the tournament is being run over two days and is being held at the Kettering Conference Centre with ten teams invited for each competitions (men & women). The SW League winners will be the region's representatives and will compete against teams from the other eight regions, plus a combined Welsh VA team.

Level II Coaching Award Courses at Bournemouth University on May 2nd / 3rd

If you have completed a Level I Coaching course and would like to take the next step towards becoming a more qualified coach, then this could be a big opportunity! We are able to offer candidates a Bursary from the National Skills Academy for Sport and Active Leisure for candidates for 66% of the actual courses costs bringing the fee for the qualification to just £50! Please distribute this e-mail to coaches in the club and expressions of interest will be followed in order to access the Bursary. At this stage we need names and not the course fees as soon as possible.

The Level II award is a minimum of 24 hours and it prepares the coach who has some experience of competitive volleyball to plan, organise, and deliver a series of volleyball sessions in a safe and enjoyable manner to a group of adults or children. The course focuses on the development of basic tactics for the 6-a-side game and progresses the basic techniques and skills that were introduced at level I, with some introduction of specialist roles. Opportunities are provided for candidates to further extend their experience of practical coaching in a group setting and

Our new club website www.academyofbeachsports.org.uk is proof that our communication is working better than ever and all our 140 members are now able to source more information more easily than ever before.

Our Academy dig in this year, (when we put the beach nets back in place, they are only there from May to Oct) promises to be the best yet and hopefully all our nets will be up in record time with more helpers and volunteers wanting to be part of the club set up and be the first to be playing on the beach again in 2009.

Over the last year the Club has gone from strength to strength. They took part in the South West Junior Grand Prix for the first time; with teams entered in the Under 15s and U17s Championships. Jersey

Volleyball is riding high in Jersey at the moment, with preparations underway to host the annual Jersey Open Tournament, and the Island team, HLB Jackson Fox, preparing for the National Cup Shield semi finals.

The 24th Jersey Open Tournament, sponsored by Insurance Corporation, will be held over the May 2-3 weekend and is expected to attract teams from across Britain and Europe.

Jersey Volleyball Association president, Paul Adamson, said: "We have magnificent facilities, and most matches are played in a hall with a full circle gallery and a ceiling that is about three stories high. "There are a number of UK clubs who enter the men's, women's and mixed events, maximising the number of matches they get for their expenditure.

"We are expecting to attract good teams from France, Belgium and elsewhere in Europe, as well as Britain. Other events, such as the Jersey Boat Show, are being held over that May bank holiday weekend, so there is plenty to see for those players who want to enjoy a holiday as well as a good competition."

Jersey's squad, HLB Jackson Fox, will be entering the Open on the back of a very successful National Cup Competition campaign.

The team faced English National Division 1 high-flyers Warwick Riga in the second round of the Cup. The step up to such opposition proved too much, but moving into the Shield Competition has shown that Jersey can still compete against lower National Division opposition.

HLB beat Division 2 team Wessex in January. To some it was a surprise but not to Jersey's coach Lee Ingram.

"Since winning last year's Jersey Open the team has had to go through a change in players, however, with all the hard work and the introduction of another two players into the squad, the team has yet again excelled and proven results beyond initial expectation," he said. "The team has beaten Solent, Wessex and Stowmarket; all good National League opposition to progress in the National Shield. Those results speak for themselves."

When HLB met Division 3 side Stowmarket in the quarter finals in February it was the first National Cup game to be played in Jersey. The home advantage worked, and in a tense five set thriller HLB beat the visitors to set up a much-anticipated trip to Middlesbrough in March. "Volleyball is doing pretty well in Jersey at the moment," Paul Adamson said. "We are celebrating our thirtieth anniversary this year, and we seem to be doing it in some style."

THE SOUTH WEST VOLLEYBALL ASSOCIATION THE FIRST FIVE YEARS

INFORMATION FROM THE ARCHIVES

This year will see the 40th anniversary of the founding of the South West Volleyball Association. The information listed below is taken mainly from the archive materials available - namely the minutes of Executive Committee meetings and copies of the SW Newsletter and sometimes from personal memory.

If any person or event has been unfairly ignored, then I apologise. Habits do not change, and it is noticeable, that some-events were not reported in the newsletter - because nobody bothered to submit an article! Before moving on to the archives, it may be helpful to sketch a background to the formation of the SW Association.

In the late 1960s there were no public Sports Halls. When the Sports Hall at Exeter University was opened it provided a large (3 court) playing area for volleyball, the like of which had never been seen before in the region. New sports centres such as Arndale Centre Poole, Mayflower at Plymouth, Christy Miller at Melksham and Whitchurch in Bristol suddenly provided decent tournament and league venues. Ironically, some of these centres have now come to the end of their working lives - the loss of the centre in Poole caused huge problems for the local association last season.

If you look back through the early editions of the SW Newsletter, you find that tournaments featuring the teams of the late 60s - Townhill Tigers from Swansea, Bedminster Down Boys Club, Speedwell School and Hartcliffe School of Bristol, Somervale School of Midsomer Norton were all played in small, low gyms.

Only Exeter University and the armed forces bases had large halls.

In searching for the prime movers behind the SW Amateur Volleyball Association (as it was first known) we have to look toward a small group of people. Ray Tingley was a teacher at Somervale School, Midsomer Norton. Later he went on to develop the Speedwell Club (who became many times national champions) - he was incredibly energetic, intelligent and full of ideas. It was so unfortunate that Ray was to die early from cancer when he had so much to offer to whatever he turned his hand.

In Bristol there were two school teams - led by Mike Rothwell at Speedwell and Phil Bollom at Hartcliffe. At Bedminster Down Boys Club, the club leader Steve Long and assistant Chris Shipman played an influential part. These were the teachers and coaches who were leading the volleyball development. There were tournaments between them but no organised association. The organisation required to bring them together was provided by George Reynolds of the CCPR, who called the initial meeting of the Association.

In the archives there is a letter from Terry Knight, our first Coaching Administrator who, following the Cornwall County Show demonstration match, wrote to the SW Squad players and said: A lot of work goes on behind that scenes, to make everything successful and we have someone working for us who is one of the best, George Reynolds. I am sure that you will join me

in saying 'thanks a lot, George, we really appreciate what you have done for us."

These are some of the archive records for our first five years as an association.

1969

February 16th - inaugural meeting of the South West Amateur Volleyball Association was held at the Technical College in Taunton.

The meeting was organized by George Reynolds of the CCPR (SW), following discussions of Ray Tingley of North East Somerset VC and Phil Bollom of Hartcliffe School. A steering committee was established with its members being:

Bill Gamble North East Somerset
Phil Bollom Hartcliffe School

Chris Page Midsomer Norton Grammar School

Terry Knight Army Southern Command Geoff Edmundson Queens College, Taunton

George Reynolds took on the role of Interim Secretary. The main discussions revolved around the need for coaching courses, one day tournaments and the formation of local leagues.

June 3/4/5 - the SW Mens Squad play demonstration matches against the International All Stars (Southgate College) at the Cornwall County Show. The Southgate team was coached by Roy Pankhurst the EVA General Secretary (and 30 years later the SWVA Vice Chairman).

September 3rd - the 5th Steering Committee meeting was held with discussions focusing on the SW Mens Squad to be coached by Terry Knight and the Womens Squad to be coached by Ray Tingley. The Bristol League began in September - the first in the region. By the end of the season the top three teams were Bedminster Down, Hartcliffe and Speedwell.

The national teams of Japan and Czechoslovakia (2nd and 3rd at the Mexico Olympics) played a demonstration match at Crystal Palace - watched by many of our emerging players in the SW (I still remember the late evening journey back to Exeter in as friend's Morris Minor van!).

Plans were in hand for an Inter Area Tournament to be held at the new Arndale Sports Centre in Poole in November and for a SW Invitational Tournament to be held at Exeter University in March 1970.

On October 19th the first SWAVA AGM was held at Exeter University. Officers elected were as follows:

The club affiliation fee to the national body (then called the Amateur Volleyball Association (AVA) was £1.10s (£1.50)

Unfortunately Terry Knight, a member of the Steering Committee was posted to Germany prior to formally taking up his position as SW Coaching Administrator. Mike Rothwell agreed to act as SW Representative at the AVA Executive Meeting.

1969 / 70

Discussion took place at a series of SW Executive Meetings to plan for:

- Officials courses at Bristol and Exeter
- Mens and Womens Senior and U19 Squads
- Setting up local leagues in Bristol, Exeter, Plymouth, Poole and Cheltenham
- Elementary Coaching Award courses
- Demonstration matches at the Bath & West Show in June 1970

1970

February - the Exeter University Invitation Tournament saw a very exciting final between Southgate and Spark - the top two English teams. The tournament was covered by BBC TV. The SW Squad lost 3-0 to both Southgate and Spark. SWAVA was grateful to receive sponsorship from a local businessman for this event. Unfortunately when we went back the following year to ask for further sponsorship we found out that the sponsor was in prison for fraud!

September - the 2^{nd} AGM - a good year with 12 clubs affiliated to AVA. Leagues had been successfully established in Bristol, Exeter and Poole, with plans for one in Weymouth. The accounts showed turnover of £167 and a net surplus of £7 9s 10d.

Chris Sherman took over as Chairman, Ray Tingley as Secretary and Jane Smythe as Womens Secretary. Brian Jones of Poole and Clive Green of Cardiff joined the Executive Committee. However by November changes had to be made and Mike Rothwell became Chairman, Chris Sherman, Interim Secretary and Peter Joignant U16 Boys Coach.

The Poole and Bournemouth Association had just begun their new league. Plessey and Telephone sports were soon to take up the running for the top spot.

1971

April - Brian Jones proposed the establishment of a SW League and donated a trophy for it. Unfortunately it failed to take off due to a lack of interest from clubs. Jane Smythe resigned, due to her taking up a teaching post in France.

June - the AGM met in a more despondent mood than the previous year - a number of CCPR coaching and refereeing courses had been cancelled and the Womens Squad had collapsed.

There was some good news - Karen Mason of Hartcliffe was selected to play for England. The number of affiliated clubs had increased to 16, but it was felt that this represented only about 35% of clubs playing in the SW.

Brian Jones was elected as Vice Chairman, Geoff Hollett as Schools Liaison Officer and new Executive Officers were elected - Alan Lewis of Poole, Ken Dufton of Exeter, Cliff Diffey of

Weymouth. At its AGM the AVA became the EVA.

1972

Ron Richards became Acting Secretary and was confirmed as secretary at the next AGM. The CCPR became the Sports Council and launched its "Sport for All" campaign.

At the AGM a new development plan was proposed by George Reynolds. Its main details included the promotion of new leagues in Taunton, Plymouth and North Glos, arranging player performance course in Poole, Cheltenham and Plymouth. A coaching service was to be offered to clubs and schools. The SW Squads were however disbanded as more emphasis was placed on arranging more regular and more local competition.

Exeter University followed up their success in becoming UAU (University) Champions by gaining promotion from National League Division Two South to Division One. It was hoped that they would soon be joined in the national league by Poole and by Concorde (a team made up of players from Bristol and from NE Somerset).

Ron Richards moved from Exeter to Bristol and established the Whitefield Volleyball Club (and subsequently the Whitefield Volleyball Tournament).

Brian Jones became SW Chairman, Peter Joignant became Officials Secretary. Phil Bollom had moved to Swindon and it was hoped that volleyball development would follow him there. Keith Nicholls had moved to Bristol to take up his post at Bristol Polytechnic and agreed to take up the post of SW Coaching Secretary.

The Exeter Summer School provided an excellent opportunity to learn to coach volleyball - at an award course led by Mike Hibbert, Roy Pankhurst and Ken Harvey.

Nationally there was concern that the EVA were proposing to "centre base" the England Mens Squad in one city ie London. However, the SW was beginning to influence national decision making with the election of Ron Richards and Brian Jones to the EVA Executive Committee.

1973

Real expansion was taking place at a regional level - the SW Championships included an U18 section and a Womens competition (won by Speedwell). An Inter City Tournament attracted 7 entries. The winners of the Mens SW Championships, held at the Mayflower Centre, Plymouth were Bristol Poly and the runners up Speedwell. There were now 29 affiliated clubs.

Rule changes introduced at the Munich Olympics allowed players to put their foot over the centre line and to block ANY ball in their opponents court. The latter rule change caused chaos and soon had to be rescinded.

Brian Jones became the EVA National League Secretary and Ron Stace became the SW Officials Secretary. At national level the day of the professional had arrived - Barrie MacGreggor was appointed as the EVA's first professional officer.

Speedwell was becoming a growing force in regional and national volleyball - particularly at schools level, where they often completed a clean sweep of trophies. In June they organized

their first international tournament at Whitchurch Sports Centre. This was to be the forerunner of the acclaimed INVO tournaments that ran at Easter until the late 70s - attracting numerous foreign teams to Whitchurch, with the players sleeping on the floor at Speedwell School or with local host families.

Volleyball in the Weymouth area was boosted by the arrival of Ian Mair, former Scottish International, who soon had the Weymouth squad beating a strong Poole squad. Another new arrival in the region was Bob Coombe - the former Spark and England captain, who set up a very successful club at Paignton.

Meanwhile, Keith Nicholl's "superteam" Bristol Mikasa had joined the new EVA Superleague and were in top place by the end of 1973.

1974

In January, Ray Tingley organized the first ever mini volleyball tournament in England. The U11 section was won by Bedminster Down and the U13 by Speedwell.

In the SW Championships, held at Melksham, the winners were Weymouth - showing continued improvement, the runners up were Bristol Mikasa. Winners of the inaugural SW Mens League were Whitefield.

The Speedwell INVO tournament attracted 50 teams, with 30 of them coming from Europe. The organization of such a large international tournament was quite a feat in itself, but it was more amazing that it went ahead successfully with the main block at Speedwell School having burnt down four days before the event. The intention was for the teams to sleep on classroom floors, but following the fire another school - Hengrove - to the south of the city had to be pressed into use and a large number of players were farmed out to 200 "foster homes" - the start of a superb tradition had taken place. In the years that followed many teams stayed in "foster homes" and often the hospitality was returned as Speedwell teams visited many of these European teams and tournaments.

Club affiliations were up to 35 clubs, though this fell the following season with an increase in affiliation fees to £5.40.

At the start of the new season, Weymouth took their place in the EVA Superleague alongside Bristol Mikasa. The Bristol League had grown to 24 teams in 3 divisions. The SW Mens League had 12 teams split into two divisions with a final tournament.

In the first five years the growth in the number of teams had been substantial and standards improved significantly. However there was still no SW Womens League (started in 1975).
